Introduction

The Kenneth L. Maddy Institute was created by a unanimous vote of the California Legislature in 1999, shortly before the passing of Senator Ken Maddy. The Institute was established as a tribute to an outstanding California leader, and as an instrument for leadership development, civic engagement and sound public policy in Central California.

The Maddy Institute is based at California State University, Fresno and is housed within the College of Social Sciences. The Institute is affiliated with the Public Administration Program of the Political Science Department which has faculty assigned to oversee the Kenneth L. Maddy Internship program.

This Report accounts for the activities of the Institute since its inception.

Mission

The mission of the Maddy Institute is to enhance government performance and civic participation, with a focus on training for public service in Central California.

Senator Maddy was known for a pragmatic, collegial approach to legislation and, over a period of three decades, was a key figure in working out agreements on major legislation between the political parties, between the two houses of the Legislature, and between the Legislature and the Governor.

The Maddy Institute seeks to carry on the spirit of bipartisanship, effectiveness and commitment to the public good that Ken Maddy exemplified.

Governance

Senator Charles Poochigian introduced SB733, which created the Kenneth L. Maddy Institute. The law calls for the Institute to be directed by the Kenneth L. Maddy Professor of Public Administration at Fresno State, under the direction of the Dean of the College of Social Sciences. University President John D. Welty appointed Dr. Harold Haak, former President of California State University, Fresno as the first Kenneth L. Maddy Professor. Dr. Haak served from 2000 to 2001. President Welty also appointed an Advisory Board, composed of members of the community (see attachment).

The University adopted a charter for the Institute in 2000, establishing an Executive Committee, composed of full-time faculty members in the Public Administration Program, the Dean, the Maddy Professor and the Chairman of the Advisory Board. During the period of 2001 through 2002, former Fresno City Mayor Daniel K. Whitehurst served as the Kenneth L. Maddy Professor.

In January of 2003, the Institute was reorganized. Under the new structure, the Institute continued to be housed within the College of Social Sciences. An Executive Director position was created, to assume the responsibilities of the Executive Committee. Jeanette Ishii was appointed as the new Executive Director, with accountability to the Dean of the College. The duties of the Maddy Professor were modified to free the position from administrative duties and define the role as an adjunct professor. In April, Senator Jim Costa was appointed to serve as the new Kenneth L. Maddy Professor. The Advisory Board continued to function as appointed by the President of the University.

In September of 2003, the Governor signed SB 452 authored by Senator Charles Poochigian. Effective January 1, 2004, the legislation requires that the Maddy Institute be administered by the President of California State University, Fresno, and organized as a nonprofit organization governed by a board of trustees. The bill provides that an executive director be responsible for implementing the institute's mission and supervising its daily operations. Instruction at the institute would be provided primarily by California State University, Fresno. It deletes the requirement that the institute and its curriculum be directed by the Kenneth L. Maddy Professor of Public Administration, under the direction of the Dean of the College of Social Sciences.

Funding

The original legislation established a \$1 million endowment for the Maddy Institute. The earnings of the endowment are transferred to the Institute for annual operations. In addition, Senator Jim Costa raised \$284,000 to create an endowment for a student internship program. Other sources of funds include: support from the University and the College of Social Sciences; donations; proceeds from fundraising events and conferences; and revenues from grants and contracts. The Institute recently received a \$188,600 grant from Valley Clean Air Now to conduct public education programs regarding air quality. In the future, the Institute will also be seeking funds from foundations and government agencies.

Staffing

The Executive Director, the Maddy Professor, an administrative support coordinator and a program consultant support the Kenneth L. Maddy Institute. In addition the Political Science faculty provide instruction and mentoring for the Maddy Internship program. The Institute also benefits by volunteer support from the Advisory Board and the community.

Programs

Internships

A core program of the Institute is the Maddy Scholar-Intern Program, which provides placements for a select group of Fresno State students in federal, state and local

government offices. The intent of the program is to give promising young people handson experience in the public process.

The Senator Jim Costa Scholarship

In the summer of 2002, Fresno State President John Welty offered to host a testimonial dinner honoring Senator Jim Costa, an alumnus of the University, for his 24 years of service to the people of California. Senator Costa agreed to the idea, and took the lead in asking his friends and supporters to contribute to a scholarship endowment for the Kenneth L. Maddy Institute. Thanks to the Senator's diligent efforts, the event generated net proceeds of over \$284,000 to enable Fresno State students to serve as interns for a semester in Sacramento or Washington D.C.

Leadership Development

The Institute offers training programs for people who are involved in government or community service.

Great Valley Leadership Institute

The Maddy Institute co-sponsors the Great Valley Leadership Institute with the Great Valley Center, with funding from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation and the James Irvine Foundation. This is an intensive, five-day program for mayors, city council members and county supervisors in the Central Valley region. The Institute has conducted three such training sessions and graduated approximately one hundred local

elected officials. The Faculty from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University brings their expertise to the training sessions.

All A's For Fresno

With funding from the Broad Foundation, the Maddy Institute and the education arm of the Greater Fresno Chamber of Commerce conducted two training sessions open to all candidates for the Fresno Unified School District Board of Trustees.

Central California Mayors Conference

The Institute helped organize the first Central California Mayors Conference in 2002 and again in 2003. The Institute arranged speakers, prepared briefing materials and handled logistics for the conferences. The Institute has been asked to organize a conference in 2004.

Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning

In the Fall Semester of 2002, the Institute began offering a series of courses leading to a certificate in Urban and Regional Planning. The program is aimed at people in the community who are involved professionally or as citizen advocates in the land use planning process.

Rose Ann Vuich Ethical Leadership Award

Each year, the Maddy Institute joins with the Fresno Business Council and the Fresno Bee to host the annual Rose Ann Vuich Ethical Leadership Award. The award serves to honor ethical elected leadership as exemplified by the qualities of former California Senator Rose Ann Vuich. At the same luncheon the Business Council awards the Excellence in Public Service Award to an outstanding individual engaged in public service. The last two years, the Maddy Institute has invited the Maddy Scholar Interns and high school leadership students from the four county area to participate in discussions about ethical leadership with former Rose Ann Vuich Award winners. The students are also hosted for the award luncheon festivities.

Forums and Roundtables

The Maddy Institute seeks to provide information to the community regarding issues affecting the region and to serve as a non-partisan forum for discussion of policy matters. The topics covered to date include: U.S.-Mexico Relations, The War on Terrorism, Schools as Center of Community and Ballot Box Planning.

The Institute has also sponsored a Legislators' Roundtable and presents an annual lecture by the Kenneth L. Maddy Professor of Public Administration.

Research and Publications on Regional Issues

In November 2002, the Institute issued calls for papers and articles on public policy issues relating to the San Joaquin Valley. The Institute has offered small grants to faculty

and students on a competitive basis. The Institute will publish the research papers when the projects have been completed.

The Institute is funding a grant through the Central Valley Political Archive at the Henry Madden Library, California State University, Fresno, to promote scholarly research involving the political papers collection of the archive. The papers held in the Library include those of Senators Ken Maddy and Jim Costa, as well as former Congressmen B.F. Sisk and Charles Pashayan.
